THOUGHTS	

PRAYER

Eternal God, I long to know you more and more. Help me sense your presence as I seek to better understand your ways. I need your guidance because sometimes I am confused by what I am reading, but I trust your love for me. Thank you for sending Jesus to show just how deep your love is. Amen.

DIGGING DEEPER

- Think about a time when you made an extreme statement for the purpose of making a point, and someone took it the wrong way. What do you think caused the misinterpretation?
- Is there a particular saying of Jesus that you have struggled to make sense of or is troubling to you?
- Read Matthew 7:1-5. Is it possible to have a log stuck in your eye? Of course not!
 - Describe the point you think Jesus was trying to make by using this extreme example.
 - This is one of many examples of Jesus using hyperbole to make a point. Google it-- find one other example of Jesus using an exaggeration as an illustration and describe what you think might be the true meaning of the passage.
 - Why do you suppose this type of teaching was so effective with the followers of Jesus?
 - Knowing that Jesus often taught in this way, how might that change your approach to Bible study?
- In *Making Sense of the Bible*, Adam Hamilton says, "Here's the point: take Jesus's words very seriously but not always literally. He's trying to lead you away from things that can harm you." (Hamilton, 246).
 - Growing up, did your parents ever overstate something to try to keep you safe?
 - Why do you suppose they went to such lengths?
 - How does it make you feel to suggest that grasping the true meaning of scripture is more involved than a simple, word-for-word reading for every passage in the Bible?
